TRICOLOUR SALAD

Recipe Servings: 2
Prep Time: 5 mins
Cook Time: 20 mins
Total Cook Time: 25 mins
Difficulty Level: Easy

Ingredients of Tricolour Salad:

For dressing:

- 1/3 cup vinegar
- 3 tbsp honey/sugar
- 1 tbsp soy sauce
- 1 tsp salt
- 2 garlic cloves (minced)
- 1-2 chilli pepper (sliced), sliced

For salad:

- 1 medium green papaya
- 1 large carrot (peeled), julienne
- 1-2 cucumbers, julienne
- 1/3 cup mint leaves, chopped
- 4 tbsp toasted peanuts

How to Tricolour Salad:

Prepare the dressing:

- Mix all the ingredients for the dressing in a small bowl and set aside.


Prepare the papaya:

- Slice off the ends of the green papaya. Using a vegetable peeler, peel the outer skin. Slice off a layer of the papaya, creating green papaya shreds;
- Toss the salad in a large bowl, mix the green papaya, carrots, cucumber, mint and peanuts;
- Pour in the dressing that's been marinating and toss to coat the vegetables with the dressing. Serve immediately.

About Tricolour Salad:

A fresh, healthy and absolutely delicious salad recipe. Packed with the goodness of carrots, green papaya and cucumbers, this dish of salad is curated in the colours of India's national flag. The sweet and sour honey-soy dressing is the perfect addition to the salad.

KERALA - MUSEUMS (7)



Napier Museum: In the heart of Thiruvananthapuram city lies the great Napier Museum and the Natural History Museum in the Museum compound, close to the Zoological park. Built in the 19th century, it has its own natural air-conditioning system. It contains a host of historical artefacts including bronze idols, ancient ornaments, a temple chariot and ivory carvings. People are especially impressed by the Japanese shadow-play leather that is used to depict the epics of the Mahabharata and Ramayana. Kerala's rich cultural heritage is in full display here. The museum was named after the former Madras Governor General, John Napier. Also known as Government Art Museum, the architectural style of museum is a mix of Indian, Chinese, Kerala and Mughal Schools of Architecture. Visiting Hours: Open 10:00 - 16:45 hrs. Closed on Mondays, Wednesday forenoons, January 26th, August 15th, Thiruvonam and Mahanavami. The Natural History Museum, a modern structure, houses some excellent exhibits like the skeletal, bird, animal and taxidermy galleries. Photography is not allowed in the museum.

Nearest railway station: Thiruvananthapuram Central, about 2 km

Nearest airport: Trivandrum International Airport, about 6 km

Krishnapuram Palace: The 'Gajendra Moksham' is a massive mural depicting an elephant saluting Lord Vishnu as the other Gods, Goddesses and sages look on in reverence. At 49 sq m, this largest single mural band of its kind ever found in Kerala, greets all who visit Krishnapuram Palace. It is said that Lord Vishnu was the chief deity of the erstwhile Kayamkulam royal family. This mural was placed at the entrance to the palace from the pond to enable the rulers to worship the deity after their bath. The Krishnapuram Palace is a rare specimen of the Kerala style of architecture, complete with gabled roofs, narrow corridors and dormer windows. Residence of the rulers of Kayamkulam Kingdom, the age of the palace is unknown. Renovated in the 18th century, the palace is today a protected monument under the Archaeology Department. Recently it was again renovated according to the scientific techniques prescribed for the protection of heritage buildings. One can come across many rare antiques and paintings when exploring this beautiful palace. Visiting Hours: 09:30 to 16:30 hrs. Closed on Mondays and National Holidays.

Nearest railway station: Kayamkulam Junction, about 8 km

Nearest airport: Trivandrum International Airport, about 103 km
